MI WILDFLOWER FARM FIELD TRIP

Join CAAS Members at a special bird walk and tour of the Michigan Wildflower Farm in Portland, MI.

Michigan Wildflower Farm is a producer of native Michigan wildflower and grass seed. Producing plants are from foundation seed collected in Michigan, most within one hundred fifty air miles from the farm in Ionia County. The species collected were present before European settlement and insofar as it is possible

to document, from sites which have not had plant materials introduced from other areas.

Sharonville SGA Guided Tour

Join MI Birds and Pheasants Forever to explore the grasslands of Sharonville State Game Area.

This 6,000-acre State Game Area doubles as an Important Bird Area and is home to a healthy grassland community supporting a globally significant population of Henslow's Sparrows along with Grasshopper Sparrows and Eastern Whip-poor-wills, all of which are sensitive Michigan species! Willow Flycatchers, Eastern Meadowlarks, and Ring-necked Pheasants are also common breeders here. We will visit enhancement sites, learn about the partnerships that made each restoration possible, and search for the over 100 breeding birds that call this area home each summer.

Meet at 9am at the parking lot at 14738 Sharon Valley Rd. Please bring your own binoculars if you have them. A few extra pairs of binoculars will be provided, if needed. Dress for the weather and wear sturdy shoes as we will be walking along paved and unpaved trails.

Houghton Lake Flats Guided Walk

July 13th - 9am-12pm

Houghton Lake Flats Flooding, Old Hwy 27, Lake Township, MI
A known breeding location of Osprey and Black Tern, Houghton Lake Flats is also home to over 120 bird species each summer! This State Wildlife Area is a hotspot for breeding and migratory waterfowl, secretive marsh birds, bald eagles, great egrets, and swallows!

Come join us as we learn about Audubon Great Lakes' and MI DNR's work monitoring black terns and osprey across the state while we search for them up-close! We will meet at 9am at the wildlife viewing station off of Old-Hwy-27. From the viewing platform, the group will walk to the dikes ¼ mile down the road, which offer great wildlife viewing opportunities of an osprey nesting platform and the marsh! Please bring your own binoculars or a spotting scope, if you have them.

WHITING FOREST BIRDING FESTIVAL

After recently opening the nation's longest canopy walk, soaring to 40 feet above the ground, the Whiting Forest at Dow Gardens in Midland Michigan offers a unique bird's eye view during migration. This year, the Whiting Forest will host their inaugural Birding Festival.

During the three-day event, attendees will learn from more than 20 distinguished conservationists, researchers, photographers, naturalists, and environmental educators. Over 30 dynamic sessions will be offered on topics such as Kirtland's Warbler Conservation, raptor identification, and birding by ear. The capstone of the festival is keynote speaker, David Allen Sibley, presenting *The Art of Identification*. Sibley is the author and illustrator of the series of successful guides to nature that bear his name,

including *The New York Times* bestseller *The Sibley Guide to Birds*.

Festival field trips will include a Dow Gardens Golf Cart Tour, Banding Demonstration and Bird Walk at the Chippewa Nature Center, and trips to the Navanquing Point Wildlife Area, Pine Haven Recreation Area and Albert Szok Preserve, Saginaw Bay Coastal Wetlands, a river cruise on the Tall Ship Appledore, and a Towhees and Tombstones walk at local cemeteries.

The festival also offers many workshops including painting, nature writing, nature photography and much more.
